



### Welcome to the 2023 Pelham Music Festival!

This year marks our twentieth anniversary! Bob Eicher, founder and benefactor of the Pelham Music Festival, launched the first festival in 2003, to provide a performance opportunity for local young musicians in a professional setting that is also warm and welcoming, and supportive at all stages of musical development. Bob and Lauren Eicher raised four children in Pelham, all of whom played piano and performed at the Pelham Music Festival. In 2016, members of the original board passed the conductor's baton to the current board in hopes that the tradition would live on in perpetuity. Despite a two-year hiatus due to Covid-19, we are thrilled to welcome performers and families back for this auspicious anniversary festival. Pelham Music Festival remains committed to the music community of Pelham and to providing this unique opportunity to share the love of music.



## Introducing our Piano Accompanists:

We are excited to welcome **Emily Xu** as a piano accompanist this year. She's a PMHS sophomore and long-time performer at the Pelham Music Festival. Emily, who credits her piano teacher Mr. Hanguan Yan for her passion for piano, completed NYSSMA level 6 in fifth grade (aged just 12!) with a score of 99, last year passed ABRSM grade 8 performance with distinction, and is currently preparing to take the ABRSM teacher certification exam. She also provides piano accompaniment for musicians in the PMHS Tri-M Recital Fundraiser. In addition to accompanying many of our younger musicians, Emily will be performing herself in Session 4, on both piano and violin.

Nely Burla has been a part of the festival for many years. A concert pianist and piano teacher, she received a doctorate degree in Piano Performance from Saratov State Conservatory, has performed numerous recitals as a soloist and chamber musician in major halls in Ukraine, Russia, Israel, Canada and the United States, and taught piano to students from beginners to professional students who now perform and teach in music schools and colleges.

### Between sessions, we are honored to have performances by local musicians:

Marcia Bean is celebrating her 28th year of teaching, and has enjoyed making music together with Pelham students since 1997. She previously taught public school orchestra in Wisconsin, where she also earned her teaching credentials and Master of Music degree in viola performance as a Strelow string quartet fellow at the University of Wisconsin at Madison. Her undergraduate degree in viola is from the Oberlin College Conservatory. She has regularly performed in regional orchestras and opera companies in Wisconsin and the New York metro area, and teaches privately in New Rochelle. Her main teacher-development project at the moment is Suzuki method teacher training and certification. She is grateful to the founders of the Pelham Music Festival who invited her to join the event many years back, and enjoys watching the students every year as they play music with friends from around town.

Andrew Dolgon is a music educator and performer who loves to share his passion for music with others. He teaches elementary band in the Pelham School District and maintains a studio of students studying tuba. When Andrew is not teaching, he enjoys playing tuba in multiple ensembles. He currently plays with the Brooklyn Wind Symphony, Tappan Zee Bridgemen, and the Westchester Community Band. Andrew studied tuba from some notable teachers throughout his collegiate experience including Velvet Brown, Aaron Tindall, Mark Lusk, Ronald Romm, Sergio Carolino, Steven Mead, Roland Szentpali, and Roger Bobo. He has performed at multiple venues including The Krannert Center for the Performing Arts (Champaign, IL), The Brucknerhaus in Linz, Austria, and David Geffen Hall at Lincoln Center.

Ellen Weiss is a singer/songwriter and multi-instrumentalist, actor, dancer, and vocal instructor, dedicated to helping people free and explore their most authentic, empowered vocal expression. Her first big love affair was with Broadway musical theater but her own musical expression goes beyond genre, always dedicated first to reaching hearts when playing her original theater, pop, folk, blues songs or the beloved Great American Songbook repertoire. Ellen has appeared in New York City clubs such as The Bitter End and Don't Tell Mama. Her theatrical productions include Kiss Me Kate and Titanic the Musical, and she can be heard as back up vocalist on Brian Kramer's blues album, "Strike While it's Hot", where she also acted as vocal coach. Presently, Ellen is part of a jazz vocal/guitar duo called "Moonglow" and teaches private vocal lessons and group classes here in Pelham, where she moved after three decades living and teaching in NYC. She has been involved in the PMF since 2019.

Andrew Van Bochove has been the Secondary Band Director for Pelham Public Schools for the past seven years. Prior to teaching in Pelham, he spent five years directing the bands at Leavitt Middle School in Las Vegas, NV. While in Las Vegas, he was a regular performer in symphony orchestras and concert bands at The Smith Center as a bassoonist. While bassoon is his primary instrument, he has spent the past several years improving skills and studying just about every instrument in the band. Andrew holds a Bachelor of Music in Music Education from New York University, where he studied bassoon with Laura Koepke and Gina Cuffari. He also received his MA in Music and Music Education from Teachers College at Columbia University. It's been a while since he's performed solo, so he's very grateful for the opportunity from all those involved with Pelham Music Festival.
